Why This? Why Now?

- Local planning efforts should serve all people who live here.
- LGBTQIA+ stories have been overlooked. In 2017, <.1% of sites on the National Register were specifically associated with LGBTQIA+ history).
- Currently no places in Raleigh are designated for LGBTQIA+ history.

Why This? Why Now?

- Began with a citizen inquiry.
- 2021 Gallup poll estimates at least 7% of US adults – over 20 million people – identify as L, G, B, or T.
- Gen Z: 1 in 5 adults born in 1997-2003 currently identify as LGBT.
- Raleigh's known LGBTQIA+ population is growing.



LGBTQIA+ Historic Context Study: Phase II

July 2024 - Early 2025

- 2 community meetings
- Written report with Raleigh-specific historic context statement
- Roster of historic places
- Initial evaluation of 20 sites (with photos)







What is a Historic Context Study?

- **Provides a high-level overview** and historical narrative of a specific theme.
- Identifies historic places that are important to that theme. Keep in mind that this work is focused on places – buildings and sites that tell the story of the people.
- Recommends buildings and sites that may be eligible for historic designation.
- Provides a way to evaluate places identified later.



LGBTQIA+ Historic Context Study

What it is Not

- This will not be the definitive history of Raleigh's LGBTQIA+ community.
- It is not comprehensive: Not all of Raleigh's important LGBTQIA+ historic spaces will be identified and evaluated.

Benefits of a Historic Context Study

- Guide future planning efforts through identification of historic places.
- Share collected knowledge with the public and other researchers.
- Empower independent community projects.
- Honor influential people and places.








Research Challenges

- Represent the diverse population that constitutes the LGBTQIA+ community
- Terminology changes over time
- Some may be reluctant to talk about this aspect of their life
- Consultant's access to the local community



Site Identification Challenges

- How do you find important places when their history isn't written down or visible?
- Potential sites are in dispersed locations as opposed to a concentrated area.
- If no one is alive to tell us about their early experience, how do we know about that place?






What, When, How Should We Designate?

- Or no active LGBTQIA+ use?



Alternative Forms of Recognition:

Beyond Traditional

Historic Designation

Traditional Historic Designation

- Federal (National Register) mostly honorary
- Local (HOD or RHL) exterior design review

These programs aren't built to recognize places of cultural heritage.

- Focused heavily on building appearance.
- Property owner consent is typically required.
- No process to designate a demolished building.





Celebrating Without Designating

Consider non-regulatory options to celebrate culturally important places.

No active non-regulatory programs exist in Raleigh.
