

**Project Scope** 


#### **Oral histories**

- Digitization will be complete by June 2024






This project identified and documented properties that had <u>not</u> been surveyed previously.



#### Special emphasis was placed on:

- churches
- entertainment venues constructed between 1945 and 1975
- places associated with the Civil Rights Movement
- properties designed/constructed by African American architects and building professionals
- Biltmore Hills

#### What is the Study List?

- Informal list of properties considered good candidates for listing on the National Register of Historic Places
  - Does not mandate or insure National Register listing.
- Properties generally must be over 50 years of age, have significance, and "integrity."

#### **Not Recommended for Study List**

Within each focus area important places were identified that were not recommended for the Study List.

#### **Entertainment Venues**

- Nearly all sites suggested at previous community meetings have been demolished
- National Register: John Chavis Memorial Park
- Community Centers were not researched

#### **Civil Rights**

#### **Meeting Places**

Demolished: First Congregational Church, Bloodworth YMCA, Greenleaf

Auditorium

National Register: John Chavis Memorial Park

#### Protest Sites (most on Fayetteville Street)

National Register: Woolworths, Eckerd's Drug Store, McLellan's

National Register & Raleigh Historic Landmark: Walgreens

Drug Store, Cromley's Sir Walter Drug Store

Not designated: Hudson-Belk, Kress, Woolworth's Cameron Village

#### **Next Steps: What Designation Means**

#### Raleigh Historic Landmarks

- A local historic designation
- Individual buildings and places
- Official local ordinance
- Reduced property taxes and design assistance
- Subject to design review process for exterior changes

### **Historic Overlay Districts**

- For neighborhoods with identified historic assets
  - Design review process that prioritizes preservation of historic building features and overall exterior appearance

# National Register of Historic Places

- Federal program
- Administered by the National Park Service and state governments
- Does not restrict an owner in any way unless the owner obtains historic preservation tax credits

#### **Next Steps: Celebrating without Designating**

Consider non-regulatory options to celebrate culturally important places


- Physical changes to a building can make historic designation difficult due to current requirements.
- Not everyone want their property to be subject to a design review process


No active non-regulatory programs exist in Raleigh

#### Heritage Communities – Greensboro, NC

- Process for recognizing history of neighborhoods
- No regulation or designated Historic status






#### **Next Steps: Celebrating without Designating**

Historic Marker Program – Winston-Salem, NC

- Provides a visual documentation of history
- Could be expensive to implement





Cultural Districts - Raleigh, NC

 Inactive program designed to promote the districts and heritage trails to showcase Raleigh's cultural importance

**Next Steps: Celebrating without Designating** 

#### Raleigh Historic Development Commission (RHDC)

RHDC's current annual work program includes investigating non-regulatory recognition programs. This will spring from the summer 2023 intern work and include future community engagement opportunities.
