New Web and Mobile App Answers Resident Garbage and Recycling Questions

Keeping track of which week recycling gets picked up or determining what can and cannot be placed in the recycle cart can be a challenge. The Solid Waste Services department is launching an online tool to make that information and more readily available to Raleigh residents.

Weekly Report 1 of 20 March 31, 2019

Raleigh Waste Wizard is a website and mobile application that lets residents sign up for personalized messages by phone, text, Twitter or email reminding them that tomorrow is garbage and yard waste day. When garbage collection is delayed due to weather, Waste Wizard takes the guess work out of the equation by sending alerts about schedule changes to residents that choose to receive alerts. The easy-to-use tool also lets residents call up and print garbage and recycling calendars or type in the name of almost any item for information about proper disposal. Residents expect to be able to easily find information about City services online – Raleigh Waste Wizard will help meet that expectation.

The software application will be available on the City website beginning in the month of May. The mobile application will be available to download for free from iTunes and the Google Play Store also in May. Over the coming weeks and months, staff will launch a public awareness campaign to alert residents about Waste Wizard – what it is and how to access it. Planned strategies include an article in the April edition of *Your Service Connection* (the newsletter insert in the monthly utility bill), presentations at CAC meetings with a leave-behind postcard, press release distribution, and a social media push on the City's main channels.

Pop-Up Art Studios at Brentwood Park Neighborhood Center

Pop-Up Studios transform community centers all over Raleigh into mobile art studios where anyone can take free, one-day art classes. Raleigh Arts provides teaching artists and supplies, and offers a variety of timeslots, topics, mediums to reach a variety interests and schedules. This approach also tests the feasibility of different kinds of arts opportunities so that future art programs can be structured in a way that works for the neighborhood. The program has previously been in residence at Laurel Hills, Walnut Creek Wetland Center, Tarboro Road Community Center, Barwell Road Community Center, Millbrook Community Center, and Horseshoe Farm Nature Preserve.

The next stop for the Pop-Up Studio Program will be <u>Brentwood Park Neighborhood Center</u>. Classes, workshops and programs will be offered from March 31 through May 4. The initial schedule includes ten sessions designed for kids; five for families; five for teens, 20 adult programs and five targeted to adults 50+. Also planned are six sessions for the whole family, scheduled to coincide with during Wake County schools spring break. A full list of programs is available on <u>raleighnc.gov.</u>

Pop-up Studio Murals Day: Five teaching artists (Peter Marin, Marc Hines, Jose Cruz, Kiara Sanders, Rick Bennett) have been asked to create family-friendly sidewalk chalk murals at the Brentwood Neighborhood Center on April 6 (rain date: April 7) beginning at 10 A.M. At the end of the day, the community is invited to join in to see the finished murals in an art opening in the park with light snacks and meet and greet with the artists from 4 to 6 P.M. Being chalk, the murals will be on display for as long as the weather allows.

The Pop-up Studio programs are offered free of charge; pre-registration is encouraged as there is limited seating and limited materials for each class. Participants may <u>Register online using Reclink</u>. Included with the *Weekly Report* materials the Brentwood flyer containing session schedules and registration information.

Capital Boulevard North Corridor Study - Big Ideas Public Outreach

The Capital Boulevard North corridor study is entering its third phase, entitled "Big Ideas." Staff and the consultant team have incorporated community input from the first two phases, along with technical data, to develop a preliminary set of strategies that address projected trip volumes in the corridor and serve the various community goals. The purpose of the Big Ideas phase will be to inform the public about these strategies. Additionally, it is an opportunity to ask for input on community preferences for different transportation improvements. The public engagement efforts will ask for guidance on two questions:

- 1. Where is local access and vehicle capacity a priority?
- 2. What elements should be in the right-of-way, including preparation for enhanced transit service and separation of local lanes from through lanes?

The Big Ideas phase will include an online survey, three (3) public meetings, multiple pop-up events, and business canvassing. Supplemental outreach efforts which includes translated study materials, will be conducted for Spanish- and Vietnamese-speaking stakeholders. The public meetings will be held at the following times and locations:

- Monday, April 1 at Green Road Community Center
- Saturday, April 6 at Marsh Creek Community Center
- Tuesday, April 16 at Body of Christ Church

Pop-up events will be held in the weeks following these meetings. The survey will be open from April 1 to May 18.

Last summer various staff attended the *Working with Citizen Advisory Committees and Boards Workshop* at the UNC School of Government. One result from that training is the development of a Citizen Advisory Council (CAC) leadership guide by Community Engagement division staff.

The purpose of the guide is to assist new chairpersons, vice chairs, and other officers serving a CAC. Content and information included with the guide will provide an understanding of the tasks before them and work successfully with the public, Community Engagement division staff, as well as other City staff with which CAC leadership interact. Each new chair or officer of a CAC will meet with the respective Community Relations Analyst at the beginning of their tenure to be acclimated with the guide's content and resources available to support the CAC.

Next steps in the process of developing the CAC *Leadership Guide* include a thorough review and discussion at the Raleigh Citizens Advisory Council (RCAC) monthly meeting, scheduled for April 17. The target date for distribution is June 30.

Accessory Dwelling Unit Informational Booklet (Council Member Stephenson)

On February 19, 2019, City Council adopted the ordinance to create Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) overlay districts, which will take effect May 20. During the February 19 Council meeting, staff was requested to provide informational material about ADUs for distribution and use at public meetings.

Staff has created a booklet to explain what an ADU is, the different types of ADUs, and the process for applying for an ADU overlay. Included with the *Weekly Report* materials is a PDF graphic of the information; please note the information presented here is intended to be printed in booklet form. Staff will provide copies to Council in printed form and will be available to present this information upon request from community organizations.

Follow Up from the March 19 City Council Meeting

St. Agnes Hospital Opportunity Zone Designation (Council Member Mendell)



During the meeting Council requested information regarding the Old St Agnes Hospital site on the campus of Saint Augustine's University. Specifically, Council asked if the site is located in a designated Opportunity Zone, and if the location had been designated at one time as an Opportunity Zone.

There are a total of 42 census tracts within, or partially within, the City that are eligible to be designated as Opportunity Zones. The designation is warranted due to the tracts being categorized as "low-income communities"; an additional 12 "eligible contiguous" tracts also exist. Staff has confirmed that the Old St.

Agnes Hospital site is located in census tract 506 and was identified by the U.S. Department of Treasury as one of 42 "eligible" census tracts in Raleigh qualified as a "low-income community".



The process for the designation of Opportunity Zones was led by U.S. Department of Treasury through recommendations by the Governor of each of the 50 states. On Feb. 13, 2018 the NC Department of Commerce released a public notice inviting interested parties to submit potential sites for the State to consider and recommend to the Department of Treasury for designation. The deadline for sites to be submitted was March 27, 2018. Prior to the deadline the City submitted ten census tracts; census tract 506 was not included in the staff recommendation. As outlined by the guidelines, the City submitted 25% (or 10) eligible and contiguous census tracts. Full guidelines and methodology of how the City selected and recommended the ten census tracts may be found in the presentation from the May 9, 2018 City Council meeting, a copy of is included with the *Weekly Report* materials. Council also received an update in *Weekly Report Issue 2019-01* (January 5). The total number of sites submitted was limited; to include a different site would result in the elimination of another site for inclusion in the 2018 list of sites submitted.

On April 20, 2018, the NC Department of Commerce released recommended Census Tracts for designation to the U.S. Treasury; census tract 506 was not included in the Commerce recommendation (https://www.nccommerce.com/news/press-releases/low-income-census-tracts-all-100-counties-selected-potential-north-carolina).

On May 18, 2018, the Department of Treasury released the certified designated census tracts and census tract 506 was not included in the U.S. Department of Treasury designation.

In follow-up to the specific question raised by Council, staff contacted Wake County government and the state Department of Commerce to determine if census tract 506 was submitted, recommended or considered as an

Opportunity Zone. It is the understanding of staff, per Wake County and the NC Department of Commerce, that census tract 506 was not submitted for consideration.






Council Member Follow Up



What is an Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU)?

An ADU is a dwelling unit that is located on the same lot as a house but is smaller in size and is used independently.





Where are ADUs allowed?

ADUs are allowed within the boundaries of an ADU overlay district, which are determined through a rezoning application process. Each ADU overlay district must be a minimum of ten acres of contiguous land.

What's an overlay district?

An overlay district is a type of zoning district that is mapped over another district and modifies the standards of that district. In this case, the ADU overlay allows ADUs in districts that would otherwise prohibit them.



The general steps of the rezoning application are:



1. Attend a pre-application conference with Planning staff to discuss the proposed rezoning.



3. Send a ballot to each property within the proposed overlay district.



5. Present your case for rezoning to the Planning Commission.



2. Host a neighborhood meeting for those in the proposed rezoning area to provide information about your request.



4. Submit the rezoning application to Planning staff.



Present your case to City Council.

City Council will review the application, the results of the neighborhood ballots, and the Planning Commission's recommendation and will make a final decision on the application. If approved by City Council, any property owner within the overlay district can submit a building permit for an ADU that meets the requirements of the Raleigh Unified Development Ordinance (UDO).

Frequently Asked Questions

How much does an ADU cost?

Fees associated with ADUs include the rezoning application process, permitting, and construction costs. Consult a building professional for an estimate.

Are there size restrictions?

Yes. See the accessory structures section in the UDO (http://bit.ly/RaleighUDO).

How many ADUs can I have on my property?

There can be one ADU per single lot.

How many people can live in an ADU?

Two adults. No limit on minors.

Can an ADU be attached to or within the structure of my current home (e.g., basement)?

Yes, as long as the primary structure is a single-family home; it is not permitted in a duplex.

Is a building permit required for an ADU?

Yes. This permit is available through Development Services.

Do I need to provide additional parking for an ADU on my property?

Yes. One additional off-street parking spot is required.

Can an ADU be on wheels?

No. It must have a foundation.


Do ADUs require utility connections?

Yes, and they can be metered separately from the house.

What can I do in my ADU?

You may live in or rent out your ADU. You may—in certain circumstances— work from it, but you may not use it as overnight lodging (e.g., Airbnb).







OPPORTUNITY ZONES

What is an Opportunity Zone?


- Federal Legislation Known as the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act – Signed December 22, 2017
- Led by the U.S. Department of the Treasury
- New Tool for Community and Economic Development to spur investment in distressed areas
- Qualified investors receive certain tax benefits when they invest unrealized capital gains in designated low-income communities
- 25% of "eligible communities" per State will be designated


Opportunity Zones in North Carolina

- Low income census tracts are areas where:
 - poverty rate is 20 percent or greater and/or
 - family income is less than 80% of the area's median income
- North Carolina has just over 1,000 low-income census tracts
- The federal law allows each state to designate up to 25 percent of its total low-income census tracts as zone candidates.
- 252 census tracts could be nominated as potential Opportunity Zones

State of North Carolina Guiding Principals

- Maintain an open submission process through public website and direct outreach
- Aim for at least one Opportunity Zone in all 100 counties
- Aim to allow each county 25% of their total low-income tracts
- Prioritize local recommendations and development goals
- Priorities state industrial site development initiatives





Opportunity Zones Designation

- February U.S. Dept of Treasury notifies States, State of NC begins outreach to local communities
- March 5 Wake County Government hosts meeting with local municipalities
- March 12 City of Raleigh submits recommendation of 10 sites to the State
- April 24 State releases a press release with final list of sites submitted across the state for potential designation
- 13 recommended sites in Wake County 10 of the sites include Raleigh jurisdiction

Next Steps

- The U.S. Department of the Treasury:
 - review the final recommendations from each state
 - provide final certification later this year
 - more specifics on guidelines and process for the program
 - timeline for when capital will flow
- Projected timeline is Late 2018/Early 2019
