



# Registrant Breakdown by Age

Nearly 300 attendees took part in this year's event. According to the 2020 Data Book Raleigh's population is predominantly younger, with 48% of residents between the ages of 15 and 44, and approximately 34% over the age of 45. At the Engage Raleigh Expo, about 43% of registrants were between 15 and 44, while 54% were over 45. We're proud that this year's expo brought together Raleigh's many generations.

# Keynote Program

### One Community, Many Generations

This year's Engage Raleigh Expo featured a keynote presentation by Dr. Valencia Hicks-Harris on "One Community, Many Generations." Her speech celebrated the connections between Raleigh residents of all ages and highlighted the importance of collaboration, community engagement, and shared experiences.

Dr. Hicks-Harris is the Executive Director and Founder of the local organization Empower All, Inc. She is also one of the first graduates of the Educational Equity Doctoral Program at North Carolina State University. With over 12 years of experience in education, including teaching in Wake County Public Schools, she is a trailblazer dedicated to broadening the teacher pipeline, encouraging responsive teaching practices,, increasing representation in STEM fields, and addressing the mental health challenges affecting youth.

Her doctoral dissertation focused on Educational Equity, reflecting her ongoing commitment to ensuring that every student has access to a fair and high-quality education.

## Workshops

The 2025 Engage Raleigh Expo offered a variety of workshops focused on community connection, intergenerational engagement, and empowerment:

- Building Legacy Through Community Connection: Explored how residents, whether long-term, new, or returning, can shape lasting community legacies.
- Generations in Sync: Real Talk, Real Impact: Highlighted the benefits of intergenerational relationships, featuring Foster Grandparents and emphasizing empathy, well-being, and community connection.
- Bridging Generations and the Digital Divide: Showcased the Digital Impact Program's efforts to improve digital literacy across ages while providing youth leadership opportunities.

 Connecting Generations Through Shared Storytelling: Focused on preserving neighborhood histories through oral storytelling, fostering a sense of place for

future generations.

- Community Preparedness for Every Generation: Provided practical guidance for disaster readiness for all ages, along with preparedness kits and resources.
- College Students Through Time:
   Examined the evolving student experience and offered ways for individuals and communities to support higher education students facing challenges such as housing and food insecurity.

Overall, the workshops highlighted collaboration, connection across generations, and ways residents can actively contribute to a stronger, more engaged Raleigh.





## Art Exhibit

At the Engage Raleigh Expo, residents took part in an interactive art activity exploring what resilience means to them and their communities. Led by a local artist, participants identified the key building blocks of happiness and strength across generations. The resulting visual artifacts will inform the City's ongoing Resilience Hub project and be displayed in community spaces to spark continued conversation.

# The Neighborhood Exchange

The Neighborhood Exchange was the heart of the 2025 Engage Raleigh Expo, building on 21 years of Raleigh's Neighborhood Exchange. City departments and community organizations created a vibrant, resource-rich filled space where exhibitors shared valuable information, highlighted local programs, and provided opportunities for residents to engage in meaningful ways to help shape the city's future.
