# <u>Duplex Village Redevelopment - Request for Proposal Update</u>

The City purchased the Duplex Village site along New Bern Ave in April 2021 utilizing bond proceeds from the 2020 Affordable Housing Bond to fund the acquisition. The acquisition included approximately 3.55 acres and cost approximately \$3.7 million. The site was rezoned in March 2024 from R-10 to RX-5-GR with the Transit Overlay District (TOD). Demolition of existing duplex structures located on the property was completed in December 2024.

Following a reassessment of site conditions, staff worked closely with Community Engagement staff to solicit input from the development community to further refine project goals and strategy. Based on feedback received, a Request for Proposals (RFP) process is now scheduled to be posted to the State of North Carolina electronic vendor portal. The North Carolina electronic Vendor Portal (eVP) is the State system to connect vendors with state government organizations that purchase goods and services. The RFP is scheduled to be posted July 23, with a deadline for the submission of proposals of October 17.

Goals of the RFP are aligned with the 2030 Comprehensive Plan as well as the *New Bern Area Plan*, with a focus on increasing affordable housing and promoting land use density in proximity to high-capacity transit along the future Bus Rapid Transit corridor.

<u>Residential Solid Waste Collection - Needs Assistance Program - Service Schedule Adjustment</u>

The Solid Waste Services (SWS) department provides curbside service to residential customers, the Needs Assistance Program (NAP) offers additional help for residents that cannot physically wheel the **recycling**, **yard waste**, or **garbage carts** to the curb and have no one living with them who can assist. Currently, participants in the NAP program exceed more than 1,900 customers with additional assistance.

To be considered for participation in the NAP program, customers must submit a completed application and agree to abide by program policies, procedures, terms, and conditions. To qualify for NAP, a resident must:

- Be a current Raleigh SWS customer who receives residential curbside services;
- Have a permanent or temporary disability and live without a non-disabled person in the residence who can move the carts to the curb;
- Submit a completed NAP application, including Part B, which requires a healthcare provider's signature. Only customers with complete applications are considered for eligibility into the Needs Assistance Program; and,

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 Acknowledge that NAP participants may be subject to annual audits to verify continued eligibility.

Recertification may be required if circumstances change, such as a non-disabled person moving into the home or if the property is sold.

Beginning August 4, Solid Waste Services is implementing a schedule change for NAP customers to establish a more balanced, efficient, and consistent service model. The purpose of the schedule change is to promote consistency, operational efficiency, and a balanced workload within the special services team. Garbage and recycling collection for NAP customers will occur on the same day of the week, and all NAP staff will be under one supervisor.

Earlier this year, Council requested information on and background on the custom of presenting a Key to the City. Records from the minutes of the Raleigh City Council indicate that last time a Key to the City was presented in Raleigh was in 1998.

The information provided below is the result of staff research of the City Council minutes and internet searches.

# Key to the City

# **Background and Context**

The tradition of presenting a Key to the City was first awarded in 1702 by Mayor Phillip French, when he offered "Freedom of the City" to Viscount Edward Cornbury, Governor of New York and New Jersey. By the mid-1800s, it became customary to award the Key to the City as a direct symbol of the City's wish that a guest feel free to come and go at will.

In the modern era, the Key to the City is a symbol of civic recognition and gratitude reserved for individuals whose service to the public and the common good rises to the highest level of achievement.

In New York City, the current Key resembles the large skeleton key that opens the back door of City Hall but is now purely symbolic – it does not open any locks or doors.

Below are excerpts from minutes of the Raleigh City Council where a "Key to the City" was referenced.

In 1974, Mayor Lightner presented a key to the City of Raleigh to the North Carolina State Basketball Team and their Coach for bringing recognition to the City. Mayor Lightner read a proclamation granting the players and coaches the privileges and rights of honorary citizens.

# 03/18/1974

WOLFPACK COUNTRY - PROCLAMATION - KEY TO THE CITY PRESENTED

North Carolina State Basketball Coach Norman Sloan was at the meeting and Mayor Lightner asked him to come forward. He indicated the City wants to pay tribute to the North Carolina State Wolfpack Basketball Team and staff who has brought recognition to the City. Mayor Lightner then read a proclamation declaring the Wolfpack players and coaches be granted the privileges and rights of Raleigh Citizenship as honorary citizens and declaring Greensboro Wolfpack Country for the week of March 17, 1974. In accepting the proclamation Coach Sloan explained the players were unable to be at the meeting today and asked Sports Director Ed Seamans to stand. Mayor Lightner then presented the State Basketball Team and Coach a key to the City of Raleigh to be displayed in their trophy case.

In 1975, Mayor Pro Tem Keeter presented Mayor Lightner and Councilman J. Oliver Williams with keys to the City, thanking them both for their expertise and guidance while serving the citizens of Raleigh.

# 11/18/1975

APPRECIATION - MAYOR LIGHTNER AND COUNCILMAN WILLIAMS - EXPRESSED

Mayor Pro Tem Keeter asked that Councilman J. Oliver Williams come forward and presented Mr. Williams with a key to the City. In making the presentation Mr. Keeter expressed the Council's appreciation for Mr. Williams' guidance, expertise and knowledge during his tenure on the City Council. Mayor Pro Tem Keeter then presented Mayor Lightner with an inscribed key to the City as well as a City of Raleigh flag in appreciation for his service as a Council member, member of the Law and Finance Committe, Chairman of the Law and Finance Committee, Mayor Pro Tem and Mayor of the City of Raleigh. Both Mayor Lightner and Mr. Williams made remarks upon receipt of the expressions of gratitude from the City Council.

In 1977, Mayor Pro Tem Keeter presented Mayor Jyles J. Coggins with a plaque of appreciation and key to the City.

# 11/15/1977

MAYOR - PLAQUE OF APPRECIATION, KEY TO THE CITY AND BOOK - PRESENTED

Mayor Pro Tem Keeter presented Mayor Jyles J. Coggins with a plaque of appreciation from the City Council, a key to the City of Raleigh, and a book entitled "Raleigh". Mayor Pro Tem Keeter then recognized members of Mayor Coggins' family who were in the audience.

In 1979, Mayor Cannon presented a key to the City to Mayor Pro Tem Wilson, thanking him for his work as a Councilman and Mayor Pro Tem.

Later in the meeting, Mayor Pro Tem Wilson presented Mayor Cannon with a key to the City as a token of appreciation from Council.

# 11/20/1979

MAYOR PRO TEM WILSON - PLAQUE AND KEY TO THE CITY PRESENTED

Mayor Cannon presented an engraved plaque and key to the City to Mayor Pro Tem Wilson for all of his work as a Councilman and Mayor Pro Tem during the past two years. Mayor Pro Tem Wilson accepted the plaque and key and expressed appreciation.

MAYOR CANNON - PLAQUE AND KEY - ACCEPTED

Mayor Pro Tem Wilson presented an engraved plaque and key to the City to Mayor Cannon as a token of appreciation from the Council for the work done by Mayor Cannon in the past two years. He indicated we have had a great two years; the Council had differences but have had fun and accomplished a lot. He indicated it was felt by all that Mayor Cannon has done an amazing job and has served the City well. Mayor Cannon accepted the plaque and key, indicating the past two years have been marvelous, exciting and challenging years. She indicated she had learned a great deal and had tried to serve the City well. She indicated she felt the Council had done many great things during the past two years. She expressed appreciation to those who have supported her and the Council who worked with her.

In 1979, City Council awarded Ernie Barnes, a native of Durham, with a key to the City for his work on an art exhibit, which was featured in the Legislative Building.

# 05/15/1979

ERNIE BARNES - TO RECEIVE KEY TO THE CITY

Mr. Knight indicated Ernie Barnes, a native of Durham, North Carolina, will be in Raleigh kicking off an art exhibit on Sunday, May 20, pointing out his work will be displayed in the Legislative Building. He explained the ceremonies that will take place and indicated he had requested the Mayor to present him a key to the City. Mr. Knight briefly explained the activities that will take place and pointed out Council members are invited to attend the reception, etc. Mr. Knight MOVED THAT

IN HONOR OF THE OCCASION THAT THE COUNCIL AWARD ERNIE BARNES WITH A KEY TO THE CITY OF RALEIGH. His motion was seconded by Mr. Womble and put to a vote which resulted in all members voting in the affirmative. THE MAYOR RULED THE MOTION ADOPTED. Mr. Knight indicated he will be at the ceremony and will be happy to present the key to the City to Mr. Barnes on behalf of the City of Raleigh.

In 1980, Mayor York presented a key to the City to Councilman William R. Knight, for his service as a City Council member.

# 01/08/1980

#### RECOGNITION OF SPECIAL AWARDS

KNIGHT - WILLIAM R. - PLAQUE AND KEY TO THE CITY - PRESENTED

Mayor York called on former Councilman William R. Knight and recognized him for the service he rendered to the City as a Councilman during the years 1973-79. Mayor York presented an engraved plaque to Mr. Knight and a key to the City. It was pointed out that it happened to be Mr. Knight's birthday and the Council and the audience joined in singing happy birthday. Mr. Knight accepted the plaque and the key, indicating he felt there has got to be a better city than Raleigh, North Carolina, but as of yet he hasn't found it.

In 1980, City Council presented Mackie (Mary) Hamilton with a key to the City for her work on various unique activities to help revitalize neighborhoods in Norfolk, VA.

# 09/16/1980

KEY TO THE CITY - PRESENTED TO MARY HAMILTON

Mrs. Block asked for a point of personal privilege to introduce a friend of hers attending the meeting. Mrs. Block introduced Mrs. Mackie (Mary) Hamilton from Norfolk, Virginia. Mrs. Block explained that she had known Mrs. Hamilton since her days at the Citadel and explained Mrs. Hamilton and her husband have lived throughout the country, pointing out when they moved to Norfolk, Virginia, they were part of the model cities program and moved into a neighborhood and helped completely revitalize the neighborhood. She explained other activities of a unique nature that Mrs. Hamilton has participated in. Mrs. Block asked for permission to present Mrs. Hamilton with a key to the City of Raleigh. Without objection, this was agreed to and Mrs. Block presented the key.

In 1984, Mayor Upchurch presented a key to the City to Vice Presidential Candidate Geraldine Ferraro, recognizing her as the first woman to ever be nominated as Vice President of the United States.

# 10/02/1984

VICE PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE GERALDINE FERRARO - KEY TO THE CITY

Mayor Upchurch indicated yesterday, he appeared at the Geraldine Ferraro rally and presented her with a key to the City of Raleigh. He stated he did this in honor and respect to the first woman to ever be nominated as Vice President of the United States.

In 1984, Mayor Upchurch presented a key to the City to Waltye Rusulala for her contributions to the City, including her work on the Arts Commission.

# 11/06/1984

PRESENTATION - KEY TO THE CITY AWARDED TO WALTYE RUSULALA

Mayor Upchurch indicated Waltye Rusulala has recently moved to Cary. He indicated, during her residency in the City of Raleigh, Ms. Rusulala has made great contributions including serving as chairperson of the Arts Commission. He indicated Ms. Rusulala helped in the dedication of the Municipal Building by singing the National Athem: He presented Ms. Rusulala with a key to the City.

In 1986, City Council established various recommendations for gifts awarded by Council, included the "key to the City".

# 05/20/1986

#### REPORT AND RECOMMENDATION OF THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL LIAISON COMMITTEE

\*\*\*COUNCIL GIFTS - APPROVED - TRANSFER OF FUNDS AUTHORIZED - POLICY HELD IN COMMITTEE

Chairman Walters reported the following recommendations:

- (1) The Committee recommends that the Council appropriate \$8,000 for the purchase of gift items for disbursement by the Council to officials and dignitaries.
- (2) The Committee recommends that the following assortment of gifts be purchased from this appropriation in minimum lots:
  - Jeweler Medallion (City Seal) set in lucite
  - b.

  - Walnut memo boxes bearing City seal
    Porcelain mugs in green with City seal
    City seal (die struck) set in brass key chains
    City seal (die struck) set into lapel pins d.
- (3) The Committee recommends that pencils, The Committee recommends that pencils, rulers and plastic litter bags be purchased for distribution to school children visiting the Municipal Building.
- (4) The Committee recommends that the presentation of the Key to the City be continued and that each recipient of the key also receive an Honorary Citizenship Certificate.
- (5) The Committee recommends that the Public Affairs Department develop a video tape of Raleigh.
- (6) The matter of disbursement policy for these gifts is held in committee for further study.

Mr. Walters moved that the Committee's recommendation be approved and the transfer of funds authorized. His motion was seconded by Mr. Campbell.

In 1986, City Council further discuss their policy for gift distribution, included a key to the City.

# 06/17/1986

#### \*\*\*VISITORS - GIFTS - POLICY APPROVED

Chairman Walters indicated Council Members received in their Agenda packet a policy for gift distribution which is recommended for approval. The policy is as follows:

1. Jewelry Medallion -

This gift be presented only to the most worthy and notable in-state/out-of-state/country visitors and dignitaries who visit the city or visited by the Mayor or his designee. In-state dignitaries may include the Governor, Speaker of the House, and Lt. Governor.

2. Key to the City -

This gift be given to dignitaries and visitors to the City whom the Mayor/Council deem worthy of being named honorary citizen. The key may be accompanied by an Honorary Citizen's Certificate.

In 1987, City Council presented a key to the City to Coretta Scott King, as a symbolic gesture of admiration for the work done by her, and her late husband.

# 04/21/1987

#### RECOGNITION OF SPECIAL AWARDS

\*\*\*CORETTA SCOTT KING - PRESENTED KEY TO THE CITY

Mayor Upchurch introduced Mrs. Coretta Scott King, who was escorted to the podium by Bruce Lightener. Mayor Upchurch indicated the City of Raleigh is a city in which people live together, pointing out we have an excellent city, and a City Council that acted very expeditiously in setting the holiday aside to honor the late Martin Luther King, Jr. Mayor Upchurch indicated Mrs. King needs no Key to the City, however, presented Mrs. King with the Key indicating he feels it is symbolic of the City that welcomes Mrs. King, admires her and her work and the work of her late husband, and the many things that he stood for.

welcomes Mrs. King, admires her and her work and the work of her late husband, and the many things that he stood for.

Mrs. King expressed appreciation to the Mayor and City Council, particularly Councilman Ralph Campbell, Jr., pointing out Mr. Campbell has a brother on the Atlanta City Council. She indicated she was in the City to express appreciation to the City Council for what they have already done and for what they will continue to do to honor her late husband. Mrs. King indicated it is our responsibility to provide role models for our young people, and we should focus on our young people as they are the ones that can make changes. She called on the Council not to leave the older people out, but pointed out we have an opportunity to shape and mold young people and childer. She indicated the actions taken by our leaders today will benefit succeeding generations. She indicated she wanted to thank the Raleigh City Council for being the first in the State to declare a holiday in honor of Martin Luther King, Jr. pointing out in her opinion that says a lot about the leadership in the City of Raleigh. She indicated Raleigh is a city that is working together trying to resolve its problems, and that is significant. She indicated we will always have some disagreement, but as long as everyone is working together, it will be to the benefit of the larger community. She expressed appreciation to the people of Raleigh on the way she had been welcomed to the City pointing out she feels very much at home. She explained she was met at the airport by a group of third graders who sang an original song in honor of her late husband. She indicated it was an integrated group, but the majority was white, and she understands that the County has a rule that no more than 30 percent minorities would be in any school, and in her opinion that is good. Mrs. King indicated she understands that the City of Raleigh has named a Boulevard for Dr. King indicated she understands that the City of Raleigh no several occasions, and she\_will be at

Mrs. King, in a prepared statement, spoke on the life of Dr. King, his goals, objectives and the work of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Non-Violent Social Change, Inc., and its goals and purposes. Mrs. King indicated she is the Chief Executive Officer of that organization, and one day she would like to see a strong representative and active King Center support group in the City of Raleigh which would be an extension of the national center in Atlanta. (Copy of Mrs. King's speech will be a part of the permanent minutes of the meeting.)

Pollowing Mrs. King's speech, Mayor Upchurch expressed appreciation for her attendance, indicating she and Dr. King have accomplished much, and should be very proud. Councilman Campbell indicated the City of Raleigh is indeed honored for Mrs. King's visit to our city. He indicated on January 19, 1987, we did honor Dr. King with a holiday in observance of his birthday. He explained the very next day, January 20, 1987, the City Council unanimously voted to name one of our major corridors in honor of Dr. King. He presented a replica of the street name sign which had an engraved plaque depicting the City Council action indicating he hoped that it will he hung in the King Center in Atlanta. Mrs. King received a standing ovation.

In 1991, Mayor Upchurch presented twenty-two representatives from Belgium a key to the City, pointing out that it was a symbol to the City of Raleigh opening its door to its

#### BELGIUM - GUESTS RECOGNIZED

Merle Creech expressed appreciation to the City Council for their support of Artsplosure and her personally during her tenure as Artsplosure Director with the City of Raleigh. She indicated her last representation of the City of Raleigh is concluding the 1990-91 Raleigh Belgium Exchange Program. She explained the program puts people in home situations and pointed out last summer 36 persons from Raleigh, Smithfield and Durham spent two weeks in Belgium. She indicated she is happy today to be a part of the return portion of that exchange. She introduced 22 Belgium residents who are in the area on the return visit. She explained the Belgium visit was coordinated by the Fire Chief of the town, pointing out his particular town has 3 nuclear stacks in the middle of the City. Representatives of Belgium, through an interpreter, expressed appreciation and gratitude for the hospitality they have received since they have been in the area. They presented the Mayor with a framed

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print from their area as well as a chocolate bar with the presenter pointing out the first time he ever saw an American was when a black American soldier gave him a chocolate bar. Mayor Upchurch presented the delegation a key to the city pointing out it was a symbol to the opening of the door of the City of Raleigh to its visitors.

In 1992, Mayor Upchurch presented Jeno Manniger, a member of the Budapest City Council, with a key to the City.

# 06/16/1992

BUDAPEST CITY COUNCIL MEMBER - JENO MANNINGER - RECOGNIZED

Mayor Upchurch recognized Jeno Manninger, a member of the Budapest City Council. He explained Mr. Manninger is assigned to the Council's Committee for World Exhibition to be held in Budapest in 1996. He sits on the Council's City Management Committee which handles urban transportation and environmental issues. He is a member of the Hungarian Democratic Forum which emphasizes political and personal freedom, human rights, a social protective net and espouses the desire to belong to the new European Community. He explained Mr. Manninger was a campaign organizer for the party's parliamentary and municipal elections. He is a lecturer at the YBL Miklos Technical College of Engineering where he earned a degree in Civil Engineering. Mayor Upchurch explained Mr. Manninger has been in the area since June 8 touring North Carolina State University, University of North Carolina, the Institute of Government, and attended the City/County Managers' Conference. Mayor Upchurch welcomed Mr. Manninger as an official representative from Budapest and presented him with a key to the City of Raleigh.

In accepting the key, Mr. Manninger indicated this is his first visit to the State and expressed appreciation for all of the courtesies extended to him.

In 1993, Mayor Upchurch presented a key to the City to Dominique Barber, who was the Poster Child for Sickle Cell Anemia for North Carolina.

Mayor Upchurch called the meeting to order and the following items were discussed with action taken as shown.

#### RECOGNITION OF SPECIAL AWARDS

SICKLE CELL ANEMIA - POSTER CHILD - INTRODUCED

Mayor Upchurch several weeks ago, Mayor Pro/Tem Franklin participated in an event that they would like to repeat. Mayor Pro/Tem Franklin stated a few weeks ago that she had an opportunity to meet the North Carolina Poster Child for Sickle Cell Anemia. She explained Dwight Spencer was the organizer of the event which was put on to help raise funds for research in that area.

Mr. Spencer introduced Eric Echols and Dominique Barber, pointing out Dominique is the North Carolina Poster Child. Mr. Spencer explained each year the Young Christian's sponsor the fund raiser to help out research in Sickle Cell Anemia. He explained that is a disease that predominately affects the African American people and a lot of education and research is needed. Mayor Upchurch presented a key to the city to Dominique Barber, pointing out the key is something we give to special people who work on special projects and he hopes that all of us working together can make a difference. Dominique's mother express appreciation to the Council on be half of Dominique and all people across the country pointing out many are affected by Sickle Cell Anemia. She stated they would like an opportunity to help educate as many people as they can as they live with this day in and day out. She stated they are available to go to clubs, organizations, etc. and talk about the problems and efforts to alleviate the problems. Dominique presented tee-shirts to all Council Members and the representative from the North Carolina Sickle Cell Anemia Association was recognized.

In 1998, Mayor Fetzer presented local television anchor Kelly Wright with a key to the City, as a symbol of the City's gratitude for his work in the Raleigh area.

He stated it has been a pleasure to serve the area. He stated his present job has left the door open for him to come back at some point if he so desires. He expressed appreciation to all.
