
Traffic Calming Construction Update

The Transportation Department, in partnership with the Engineering Services Department, is preparing to begin the FY24 Traffic Calming Project construction. The 17 projects comprising this package progressed through the resident engagement and approval process throughout 2023 and approval to move to final design and construction was granted at the January 2, 2024, Council meeting. The construction contract was awarded to Lanier Construction Company, Inc during the June 3, 2025, City Council meeting.

A vicinity map for each project is shown below.

Traffic Calming Project Vicinity Map



With the awarded bid, these projects are now entering into the physical construction phase of project delivery. Notifications were sent to all properties along these streets as well as those that live in the approximate two-block radius surrounding these transportation projects in the last two weeks of July. These mailers alerted residents of the pending construction as well as directed them to the City's website where they can review the project layouts as well as the construction timeline once that has been provided to the

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City by the contractor. This construction page will be updated throughout the project's duration to communicate construction progress and schedules to the public.


The official *Notice to Proceed* is currently expected to be issued to Lanier Construction by the end of August, with physical construction to begin shortly after the issuance. The construction project page will be updated with the construction schedule and tentative timelines as soon as that information is available.

Six Forks Road – Carroll Middle School Sidewalk Gap Construction

Starting on Monday, August 18, the City's contractor will begin construction of a sidewalk gap on Six Forks Road along the frontage of Carroll Middle School. This was one of the priority improvements directed by Council during the July 1 meeting resulting from the cancellation of the Six Forks Road Improvement project.



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Work will occur daily between 9AM and 4PM, with anticipated completion by Friday, August 22, ahead of the start of the 2025-2026 Wake County Public Schools (WCPSS) school year on Monday, August 25. WCPSS staff have been made aware of this effort and City staff will remain in contact with them throughout. The work will require a daily lane closure along Six Forks Road in the area between Lassiter Mill Road and Northbrook Drive; a message board alerting the public to this temporary obstruction will be placed on Six Forks Road ahead of construction. Additional public communications are in the works to highlight this important effort.

A New Era for Bikeshare in Raleigh

The City's dockless bikeshare pilot with Lime and Spin e-bikes launches Monday, August 18 and will run through April 2026. This program replaces the Cardinal Bikeshare system, which officially closed for public use on August 12 in preparation for equipment and asset removal.

Launch information for the dockless bikeshare pilot and the Cardinal Bikeshare closure were communicated to the public through social media updates, gov-delivery email notifications, and City webpage updates.

Raleigh's New Dockless Bikeshare Pilot

The new dockless system offers users a more flexible, updated bikeshare program, based on best practices and public feedback. It expands service to areas of Raleigh not previously reached by bikeshare, at no cost to the City.

During the pilot, the City will:

- Deploy 215 dockless e-bikes from Spin and Lime across downtown Raleigh.
- Add new parking areas to help keep the sidewalks clear and bikes parked neatly. Initial striping for new parking areas will occur this Fall, and enhanced markings and art will be added in Summer 2026 for increased visibility.
- Gather data and feedback from the public to help inform the future of the program.

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Lime e-bike Spin e-bike

Staff will post updates, collect feedback, and invite public input throughout the pilot. Community feedback will be solicited through various opportunities, including, but not limited to, online surveys and educational events. Community feedback and trip data will help shape the program's future. Residents and members of the public can also:

The Community Engagement Department finalized the Former DMV Site Engagement Report, wrapping up nearly two years of deep public engagement around the site's future. This report captures a comprehensive,

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community-rooted process from September 2023 to June 2025 and outlines key insights, priorities, and recommendations that will inform the future Request for Proposal (RFP) for redevelopment of the site.

Engagement Highlights

- 700+ survey responses
- 55+ community events
- 12 PWG members who met monthly for over a year
- 5,000+ printed materials distributed
- 14 in-depth PWG sessions, including engagement and planning workshops

Meet Us at the Square Recap

On August 13, Housing and Community Development hosted the third annual *Meet Us at The Square* community event at Moore Square Park. The purpose of the event was to extend holistic support and resources to individuals experiencing homelessness or housing instability. While unaffordable housing is the root cause of homelessness, and the way to end homelessness is permanent housing plus supports, events like this play a vital role in meeting the immediate needs of our neighbors.



Uniting non-profit organizations, service providers, volunteers, and community members, the event offered a comprehensive array of services and donations to individuals in need. *Meet Us at The Square* represents a

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convergence point for sources of assistance, with the purpose of increasing accessibility and engagement with the services available in Raleigh for people experiencing or at risk of homelessness.



Over 30 organizations and City departments braved the rain to participate, offering services such as:

- Free health screenings
- Barber/Salon
- Showers
- Employment assistance
- Food & Clothing distribution
- Transportation resources
- Veterinary Care



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Food was provided by Oink n Moo, who served 543 lunches. Special thanks to the following City departments who also participated and helped make the event a success: Raleigh Parks, Communications, Fire, Police/ACORNS, Community Engagement, Transportation, Public Utilities, and the Economic and Social Advancement departments.

Subject	Monthly Update on Reflecting Raleigh: The Next Comprehensive Plan

Overview

Raleigh's Comprehensive Plan serves as the city's long-term vision for the built environment and is required by state law to enforce zoning and development regulations. Originally adopted in 2009 and updated in 2019, the plan includes policies that guide Raleigh's growth in alignment with adopted Vision Themes, Growth Framework, and tools such as the Future Land Use Map and Urban Form Map.

<u>Reflecting Raleigh</u> is the process of developing the Next Comprehensive Plan, which will include a focus on sustainable and equitable growth, aligning adopted city plans and priorities, and enhanced community engagement. Reflecting Raleigh includes five phases.



Phase I is complete. This memo includes an update on the final community conversation event on July 10 and a summary of emerging themes across phase I engagement activities.

Affordable Housing Summit Recap Event

The final event in the Reflecting Raleigh Community Conversation series featured a screening of the keynote presentation from the Affordable Housing Summit in August 2024 followed by guided tabletop conversations using the World Café method of facilitation.

After the first Affordable Housing Summit and throughout the community conversation series, staff heard from residents that many wanted another opportunity to provide feedback on the topic. Given the wide interest in affordable housing, staff responded with a return to the topic for the final event in the series.

This Housing Summit Recap event took place on July 10 from 6-8pm at Iglesia Pacto de Vida Eterna, a church located in District C at 1021 Corporation Parkway. The church's pastors and many of the church's members are Spanish-speaking residents with strong ties to Raleigh's Dominican community. Community Engagement and Planning and Development staff worked with church staff and community partners to promote the event in English and in Spanish.

Thanks to these efforts, the recap event was fully bilingual, hosted in English and Spanish with interpreters to support the World Café dialogue. Three hundred thirty-two (332) people completed the survey; 260 attended the Housing Summit in August of 2024; and 51 people attended the Housing Summit Recap event in August of 2025.

Key Themes from Phase I Engagement

Across all six topic area surveys and Community Conversations, five top priorities emerged from participant input:

- 1. Community education and engagement
- 2. "Smart" growth through strategic density and connectivity
- 3. Housing affordability, variety, and supply
- 4. Sustainable development and infrastructure
- 5. Preservation and distribution of natural resources

A full report summarizing Reflecting Raleigh's phase I engagement activities, who participated, and what staff heard will be published to the Reflecting Raleigh website at the end of the month. Community members are invited to attend one of two webinars on September 3 from 6:00 – 7:00 pm or on September 5 from 12:00 –1:00 pm to learn more about the information collected in phase I and upcoming opportunities to engage in phase II of the project. Registration information is available on the Reflecting Raleigh events webpage.

Staff will share a detailed summary of phase I of the project and a forecast for phase II with City Council at the upcoming retreat on September 27. Other opportunities to share information and receive input from City Council on this project include a work session in October and action items on subsequent meeting agendas throughout the fall.

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Acknowledgement & Gratitude

This journey wouldn't have been possible without the voices, vision, and dedication of the Southeast Raleigh Community. The Community Engagement Department expresses heartfelt gratitude to Raleigh residents, legacy families, City Council, staff, and local partners who helped bring this project to life. A special thank you to those who helped us every step of the way to ensure this work remained rooted in community.

Introduction

From September 2023 to June 2025, the City of Raleigh undertook engagement for the redevelopment of the former DMV Site. This Engagement Report provides an overview of that community-centered engagement process. This effort prioritized both the community and city vision, aiming to ensure that future development is guided by the people it will impact most.

This project marks the City of Raleigh's first major redevelopment project led by deep, sustained public engagement. The effort fully prioritized community engagement from the start and reflects a shift toward more inclusive and collaborative planning, while honoring Southeast Raleigh's rich cultural history. Together, we've charted a course that blends vision with values, and a future rooted in partnership, resilience, and belonging.

Site History and Community Legacy

Located at 1100 New Bern Avenue, this land has deep historical roots in Southeast Raleigh. Prior to the construction of the North Carolina Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) headquarters, the property played a variety of roles in Raleigh's history. Notably, the site was home to the first North Carolina State Fair sponsored by the State Agricultural Society, which was held there from 1853 to 1872.

Years later, this area became home to a vibrant and close-knit Black community in Southeast Raleigh. Families, churches, and local businesses helped shape a neighborhood full of culture, pride, and connection, particularly during and after the era of segregation.

As the City of Raleigh moves forward with redevelopment of the site, there is an opportunity to acknowledge this layered history and make a turning point by building something that honors the past, supports today's community, and creates new opportunities for the future.

City Acquisition of the Site

In January 2019, the city began working with state leaders and North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) to explore future uses for the former DMV headquarters. Following the DMV's relocation to Rocky Mount, an opportunity emerged to reclaim the property for local benefit. That vision was later reinforced by the New Bern Station Area Plan, which provided a foundational blueprint for how the site could evolve. The potential site opportunities identified by the City of Raleigh at the time included:

- Enhanced Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Station
- Mixed Income Housing
- Greenspace, Linear Park, or Enhanced Connectivity to other green space, heritage or recreation amenities
- Supportive services for businesses and residents.

On June 24, 2024, the City of Raleigh officially acquired the 5.88-acre site, and with the vision of a community-driven development. Historically, this part of Southeast Raleigh was home to many African Americans during segregation and is known for its resilience, strong social bonds, and cultural richness. While the neighborhood has experienced change through increased development and rising costs, many long-time residents remain, maintaining the spirit of connection that defines the area. The city wants to make sure the future of this site reflects and honors that history.



Project Working Group (PWG)

To ensure meaningful participation, the City established a Project Working Group (PWG) comprising of 12 Raleigh residents, many of whom are legacy residents, community leaders, and neighborhood advocates. The PWG was instrumental in shaping engagement strategies and served as authentic ambassadors to the broader community.

During the early research phase, City staff met with representatives from Prosper Portland and the William & Russell CDC Board to learn from similar redevelopment efforts and support early visioning. Staff also met with local community leaders who have significant ties and impact in the Southeast Raleigh community. Over a six-month period, this group informally became "Process Leaders" and would spend about two-hours a month brainstorming viable uses for the site, and ways to incorporate community feedback. These conversations helped inform the formation and focus of the PWG.







The Project Working Group met monthly for over 13 months, with all meetings open to the public. Early sessions focused on building knowledge around redevelopment processes, the site's history, and prior Cityfunded projects. The group also reviewed case studies, learned from the City's Documentarians in Residence, and developed a Group Charter identifying responsibilities, roles, and milestones.

In addition to their monthly meetings, PWG members received engagement training and outreach tools, including meeting-in-a-box kits, social media templates, and printed project materials. These resources helped the group build shared values and co-create Request for Proposal (RFP) criteria that reflect community priorities, guiding the Request for Proposal for the site's redevelopment.

Community Kickoff Event

On Saturday, August 24, over 300 neighbors gathered at the Former DMV Site to share food, stories, and ideas. We collected 469 comments from community members and the following community priorities emerged:

- Food/Market
- Affordable Housing
- Community Spaces & Recreation
- Health & Social Services
- Education & Training
- Shopping & Entertainment

Community Office Hours

From October 2024 to February 2025, we hosted monthly office hours at the former DMV site, creating space for residents to share their thoughts, ask questions, and connect face-to-face with staff about the project.

Former DMV Site Redevelopment Survey


Between October 2024 to March 2025, the City of Raleigh conducted a survey to gather community input on the future of the former DMV site. Over 700 participants shared their thoughts, helping to shape the vision for this space.

These responses provided valuable insights into community priorities and values, guiding the redevelopment planning process.

Vetted List of Site Opportunities

Following all engagement activities, the Project Working Group spent hours meeting to compile a vetted list of site opportunities that reflect the community priorities and values. This list is organized by high priority opportunities and lower priority opportunities, and is ranked in order of importance:

Must Haves/High Priorities:

Like to Haves/Low Priorities

1. Affordable Housing (Space Requirement & Strategy)

Key Goal: Housing options for 30-60% Area Medium Income (AMI).

Focus Area: Various family sizes, incomes, and employment types.

3. Community Space (Space Requirement & Strategy)

Key Goal: Multipurpose indoor space with variety and flexibility in room size and state of the art technology

Focus Area: Workforce development, educational classes, performances, etc

5. Cultural Recognition (Strategy)

Key Goal: Cultural destination reflective of the historic community.

Focus Area: Art, wayfinding, historical markers, and sculpture recognition.

1. Sustainability and Innovation (Strategy)

Key Goal: Varied architectural style, project creativity, and sustainability.

2. Retail (Space Requirement & Strategy)

Key Goal: Space for local, small businesses that reflect the historic New Bern Avenue corridor community.

Focus Area: Provide access to essential goods.

4. Food Incubator & Co-op Space (Space Requirement & Strategy)

Key Goal: Space that provides fresh, healthy, and affordable food access.

Focus Area: Commissary Kitchen for food services to access a commercial kitchen.

6. Universal Site Design

Key Goal: Design that's accessible to all.

Focus Area: Beyond Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) minimum.

2. Childcare Options

Key Goal: Drop-in daycare.

Conclusion

The work at the Former DMV Site reflects more than redevelopment, it's about legacy. It symbolizes a deep commitment to community restoration, intentional engagement, and collaborative planning. From the beginning, Southeast Raleigh residents have co-developed this process with heart, resilience, and hope.

Next steps include:

- Completion of a third-party market study analysis
- Development of community-driven Request for Proposal criteria to guide future proposals
- Site demolition and environmental remediation
- Exploration of various financing strategies to support intentional development
- Ongoing temporary site activations and storytelling initiatives to keep the community engaged

This is only the beginning. Together, we will continue shaping the future of New Bern Avenue and ensure it reflects where we've been, serves who we are, and leads us into where we're going as a city for generations to come.





Community-Centered Visioning	A participatory approach to planning and decision-making that prioritizes the perspectives, needs, and aspirations of community members, particularly legacy residents and those most impacted by redevelopment. This process ensures that the redevelopment reflects the values and desires of the community.	
Temporary Activation	Short-term initiatives or events designed to utilize the Former DMV Site before permanent redevelopment occurs.	
Legacy Residents	Long-term residents of Southeast Raleigh who have historical and cultural ties to the area across generations.	
Community Priorities	Key concerns, needs, and aspirations identified by community members through engagement efforts.	
Project Working Group (PWG)	A group of individuals representing various stakeholders, including current and legacy residents, as well as community leaders, tasked with advising on the redevelopment process of the Former DMV Site. The PWG ensures that the project remains community-focused and aligned with the established vision and values.	
RFP (Request for Proposals) / RFI (Request for Information)	Document(s) issued by the City of Raleigh to solicit interest from developers, organizations, or other entities for the redevelopment of the Former DMV Site. These requests outline the criteria and expectations for proposals and provide an opportunity for potential partners to propose solutions aligned with the community's vision.	
Pre-Proposal Meeting	Meeting(s) held during the formal proposal submission process to provide interested developers with an understanding of the community's vision, redevelopment goals, and criteria. This meeting allows for dialogue between stakeholders and potential project partners.	
Site Opportunities	Potential uses or redevelopment possibilities for the Former DMV Site. These opportunities are evaluated based on feasibility, community alignment, and impact. Examples may include mixed-use development, affordable housing, community spaces, and economic development initiatives.




What is your ethnic identification?
