The new home owner of 519 Moseley has requested I get an arborists to inspect and provide an opinion on the many trees at the back of my property (536 E Jones Street), some of which are leaning and hanging over his new home.

I contracted American Arborists to inspect the trees and to give an opinion as to what, if anything should be done. The result of the inspection was that two trees should be removed, due to a declining state and a dangerous lean angle.

My property, which is only .17 acres, has 8 large mature trees, 1 in the right-of-way, two along the side of the house, and 5 in the rear yard. As evidenced by the google maps photo below, the entire property has a full canopy. Also, in the rear yard are two smaller, newer trees that grew from a woodpile a previous owner maintained at the property. Due to the dense canopy, both of these trees grew very diagonally in their quest for sunlight. It is these two trees that were of concern of the new neighbor, and have been identified by American Arborists as requiring removal. Per the arborists they are damaged and dying. They are also very near the new house on Moseley so even if they do not fall in the next few years, if they grow much more they would begin to contact and damage the new home.

Neither of these trees they are visible from either Jones street or Mosely, and there are mature trees on either side. Towards Jones Street there is a large mature tree less than 5' from the base of one of the trees. Towards Mosely there is a large mature tree approximately 15' from the base of the other tree to be removed.


Considering the already dense canopy, and that these trees do not add anything to the aesthetic of the property, I do not believe it is necessary or prudent to replace the trees in the same location. Nor do I think it would even work to do so, as there is very little sunlight due to the shade provided by the remaining trees.

However, in the only area of the rear yard that has any sunlight at all, I had a volunteer oak tree sprout maybe 5-7 years ago that I nurtured and has grown to about 8' feet tall now. I'd guess about the exact height of one that I'd purchase today if I needed to add a tree. It wasn't done with any intention related to this COA, but it is essentially replacing the trees being removed. It's in the only spot in the rear yard that has sufficient sunlight to hope to survive and thrive.




Site map of trees on the property:

Young trees as replacements to trees being removed. =






Picture of Front of house, as requested. This is from Google. It appears to be from this past fall, but it's the current tenets cars so it's fairly recent.



This photo I took on May 27<sup>th</sup> when I was in town. It shows th rest of the yard the last photo didn't cover.




The far left tree is the larger more mature tree that will remain. The three main trunks farther right, which stem from two trees, are what the arborists has recommended be removed. As you can see the two on the right hang directly over the new home.



Here is a picture showing the extreme angle of trees to be removed.




Pictures of the overall backyard were requested. The next two photos are the best I have. Only the far opposite side of the yard from the trees in question is not visible in the first photo. This one was taken several weeks ago by the tenant. The smaller of the two young trees hadn't sprouted leaves yet for the spring which is why I thought it had died.




Here is a better picture showing the size of the trees to be removed versus the larger tree that stands over it. The top arrow points to the larger of the two trees. The second is hidden behind the large tree. This photo also shows the oak that I've nurtured from a seedling that I would like to be considered as the replacement. This is the lower arrow. Also shown is a second oak that I tried to grow but looks to have not come back this spring. (Just to the right of the other new one.) Due to the thick canopy over the yard I don't think adding another tree would really work.


However, if really needed, please say so and I'll gladly do it, so as to prevent having to deal with the hassle of a major work COA.



**Update/Revision:** Initial COA application was rejected citing a need for an equal number of trees to be added as removed. Plan is to remove two trees and initial COA only mentioned one replacement, being a volunteer seedling that has grown into a 10-12 ft tall oak. I don't live at the property anymore and I was going off of some photo's my tenants took. I visited the property recently and realized the second sampling that appeared to be dead is still alive. See new pictures below, taken May 27th. However, it doesn't appear to be an oak as I thought and was told from the tenant at the time that suggested we let them grow. I have absolutely no idea what type of tree it is, but it is a tree of some sort, and spawned from another tree in the area, and therefore hopefully will fulfill this purpose?
