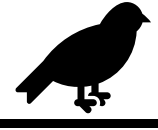


# Upland Area Tree Planting List



	Bitternut Hickory is a tall, slender, cylindrical deciduous tree with a broad pyramid-shaped crown. It is native to North Carolina and usually found on moist, rich soils in relatively open areas where the tree can find sun.	<i>Carya cordiformis</i>	Bitternut Hickory	 	
	Pignut Hickory is a medium to a large deciduous tree that is native to eastern southeastern, and central USA and parts of Canada. It is found in all areas of NC. As with most hickories, it is a strong, tall tree with a straight trunk and dense oval to rounded form.	<i>Carya glabra</i>	Pignut Hickory	 	
	Mockernut Hickory is a large deciduous tree that is native to eastern and central USA and can be found in all areas of NC. It is fairly slow growing and will reach heights of 50 to 80 feet tall or more.	<i>Carya tomentosa</i>	Mockernut Hickory	 	
	Flowering dogwood is a woody, deciduous, flowering understory tree in the Cornaceae (dogwood) family that may grow 15 to 25 feet tall. It is native from southeastern Canada to eastern North America to eastern Mexico.	<i>Cornus florida</i>	Flowering Dogwood	  	
	American holly is a woody, broadleaf evergreen tree in the Aquifoliaceae (holly) family that has generated numerous cultivars. In nature, it is found growing as an understory tree or shrub in moist, deciduous forests in central and southeastern United States.	<i>Ilex opaca</i>	American Holly	  	
	The tulip poplar is a native large deciduous tree that may grow 90 to 120 feet tall and takes its name from its greenish-yellow heartwood and attractive tulip-like flowers.	<i>Liriodendron tulipifera</i>	Tulip Poplar	   	
	Black gum or black tupelo is a medium-sized, native deciduous tree in the Nyssaceae family. Growing throughout North Carolina in dry upland forests, occasionally in bottomlands, savannas, swamp margins, and upland depressions that are occasionally flooded.	<i>Nyssa sylvatica</i>	Black Gum	 	
	Loblolly Pine is an evergreen gymnosperm tree that may grow 60 to 90 feet tall. It is loosely pyramidal in youth and develops a dense oval crown at maturity as it loses its lower branches.	<i>Pinus taeda</i>	Loblolly Pine	 	
	The white oak is a large deciduous, hardwood tree is slow growing and can reach heights of 135 feet with an 80-foot spread but generally tops out at 80 to 100 feet. Young trees are typically pyramidal in form, but as the tree matures it has a rounded and broad crown.	<i>Quercus alba</i>	White Oak	 	
	Southern Red Oak is a native deciduous tree and is found in all areas of NC up to 2,000 ft. of elevation. It may grow 60 to 100 feet tall and spread 50-60 feet with a broad open rounded form.	<i>Quercus falcata</i>	Southern Red Oak		
	Chestnut oak is a medium to large native deciduous tree in the white oak family. It is native to the eastern and central USA including the mountains and Piedmont of NC.	<i>Quercus montana</i>	Chestnut Oak
