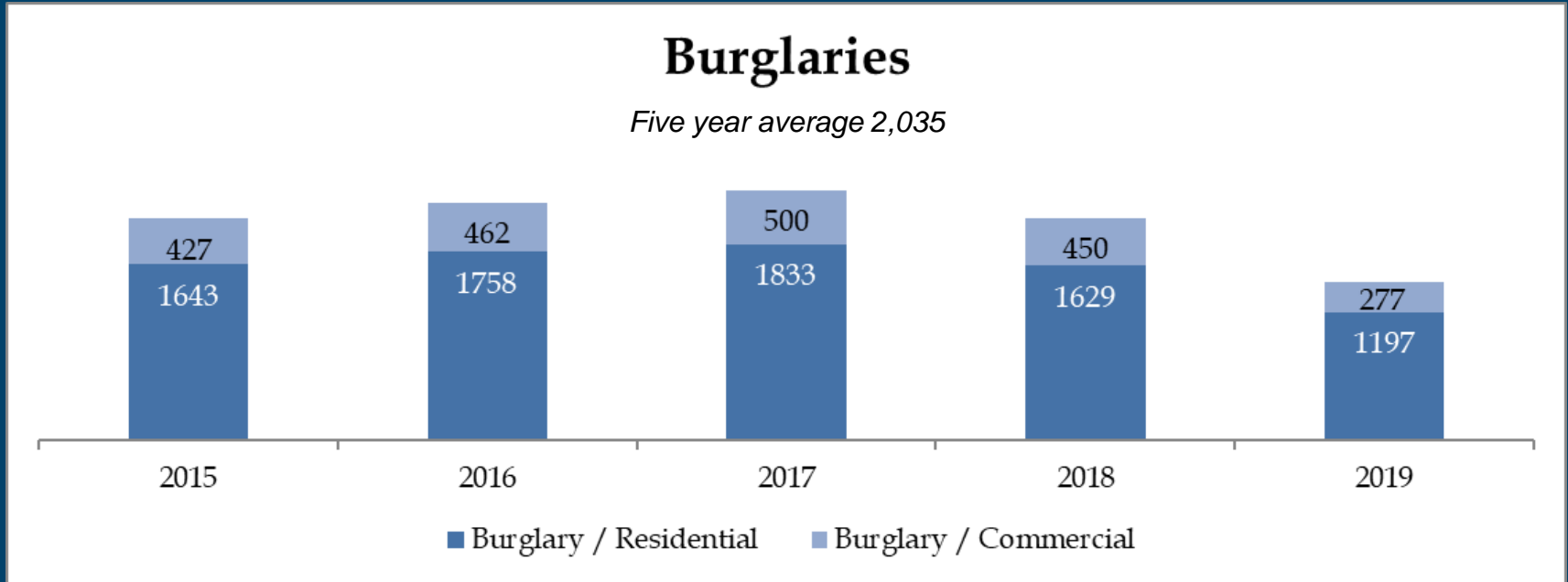

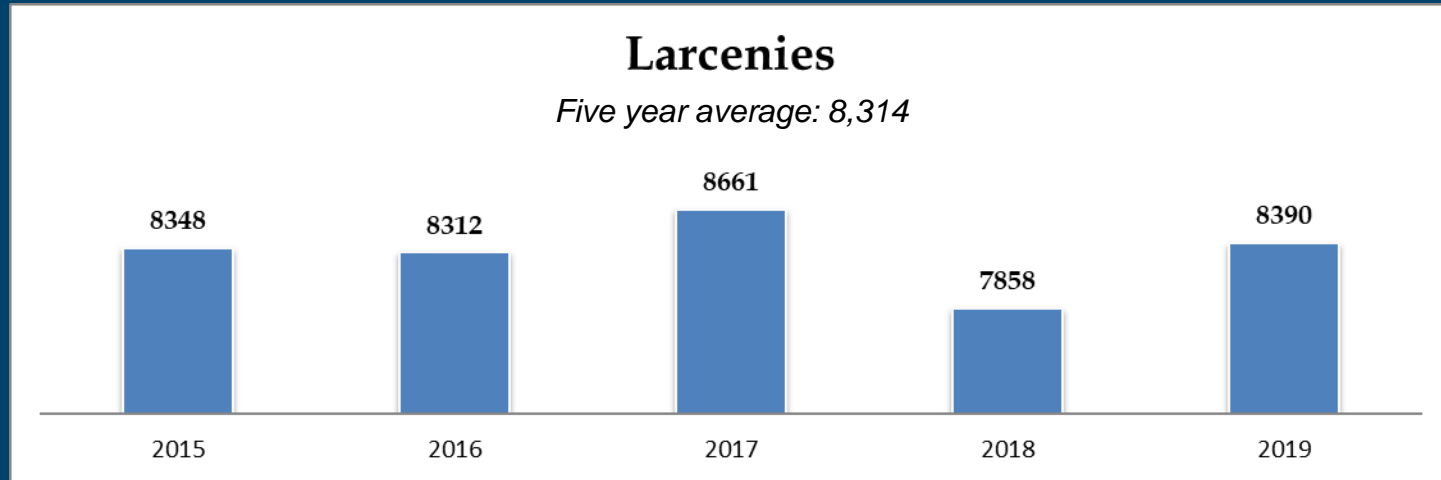

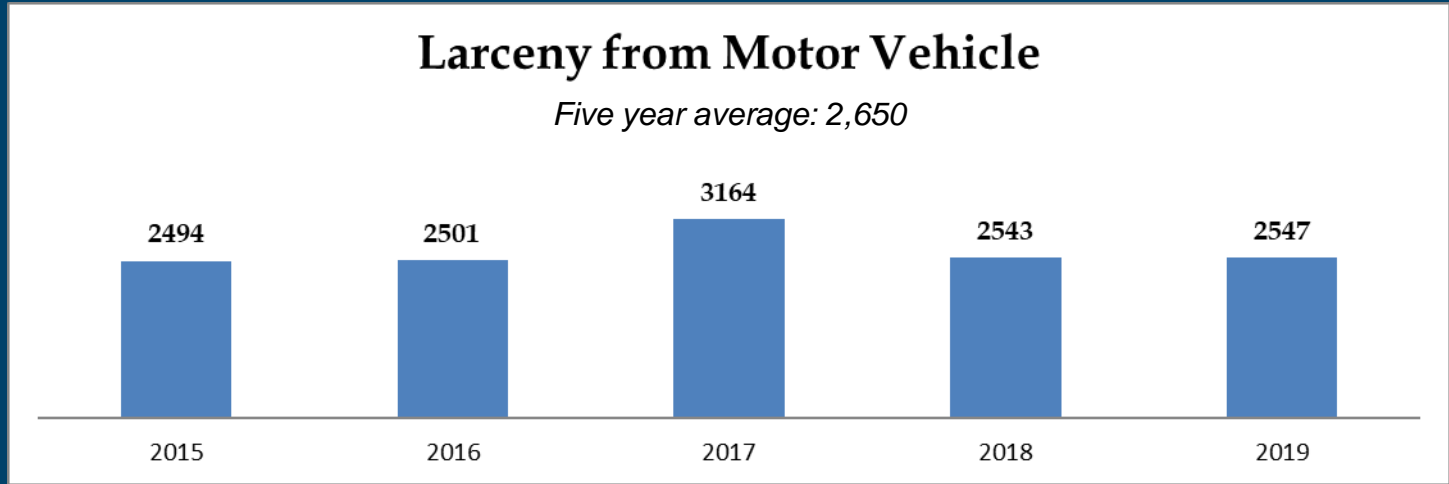

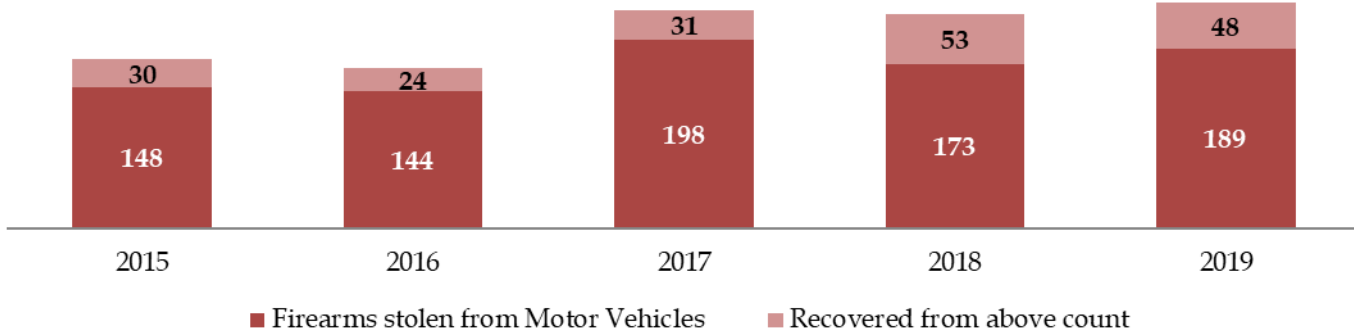
Larceny from Motor Vehicle

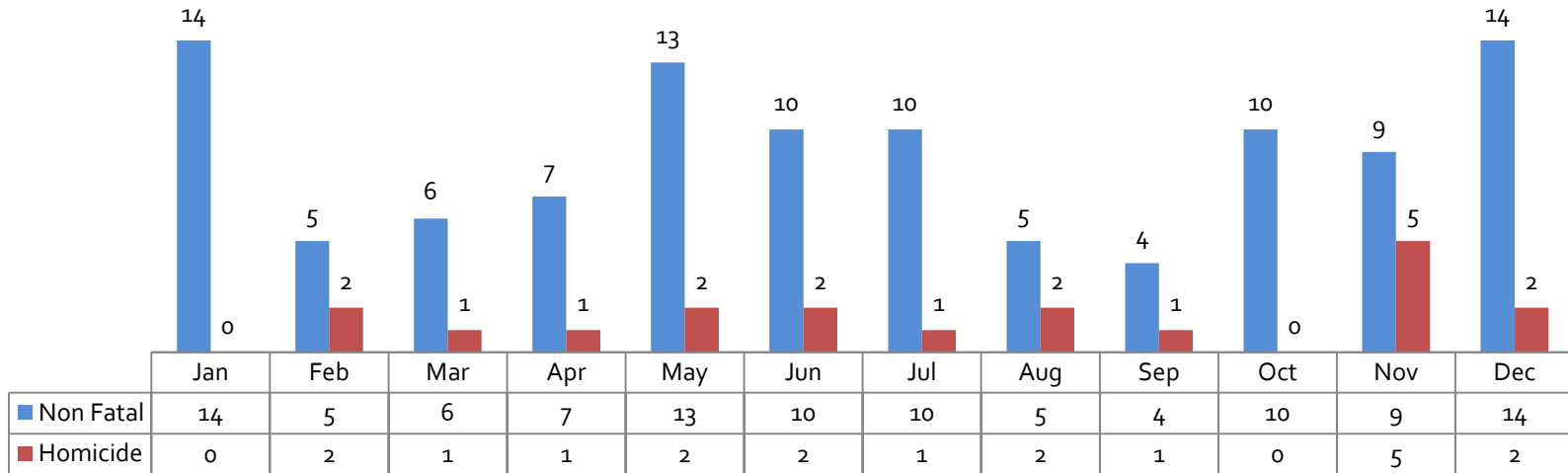
Firearms Stolen from Vehicles

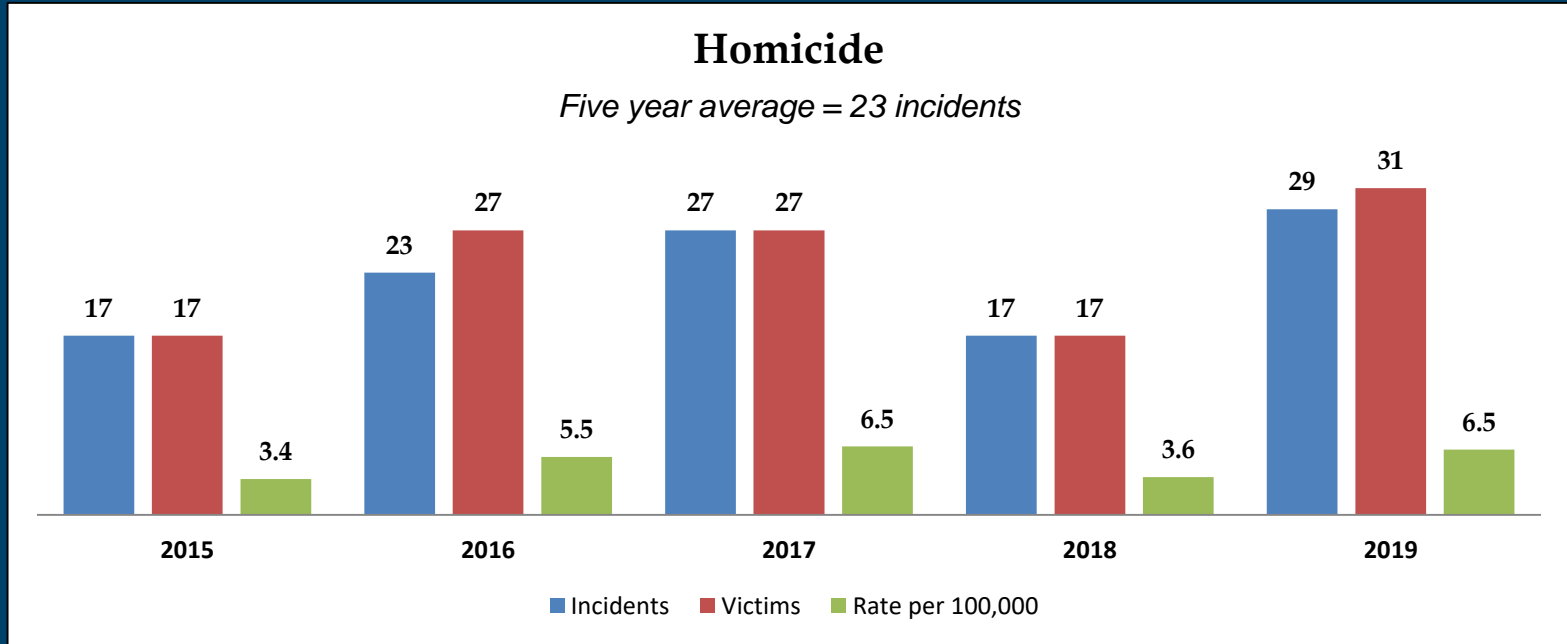

 Shawn Blanchard rose from humble beginnings to become a bestselling author, speaker, and mentorship specialist. Along the way, he co-founded a successful mentoring program, led a math department to the top 5 percent in New York City, and helped start a fitness movement that helped hundreds of people to adopt healthier lifestyles. As the City of Detroit's Director of Youth Services, he launched a citywide elementary-age soccer league and led the "Grow Detroit's Young Talent" youth employment initiative, which provided nearly 5,600 jobs to area youth. Mr. Blanchard wrote a best-selling book, "How Bout that for a Crack Baby: Keys to Mentorship and Success," and founded University of Mogus Publishing and Design, where he offers publishing and design services to aspiring authors.

 Ilina Ewen uses her voice to bring awareness to issues related to the well-being of children, politics, and public education. She served as North Carolina's representative to Parenting magazine's Mom Congress, a United Nations Foundation GlobalLife Statewide Champion, social media ambassador for the Food Bank of Central and Eastern North Carolina, and serves on many boards. She lends her time and talent to the boards of the Cecilia Rawlins Fund and VAE, as well as the advisory committee for the Green Chair Project. As a writer and marketing consultant, Ilina gets a chance to put her Masters in Integrated Marketing from Northwestern University to use.

 Ed Games is an award-winning writer, activist, counselor and coach who founded "From Afros to Sheltoes," a community organization focused on cultural productions that bridge generation gaps between youth, elders, and the hip-hop community. Mr. Games is a highly sought-after commentator on hip hop, Black identity, manhood, and popular culture. His national speaking tour, "Sweet Tea Ethics," created a dialogue about issues facing the Black community and American society while also bringing its audience practical strategies for personal development.

 Christian Gray is the founder and CEO of DIVERSE (Dedicated Individuals who Value Education, Relationships, Success and Effort), a nonprofit community-based organization dedicated to developing leaders on and off the basketball court. As a basketball coach, he has worked with players of all ages, serving on the coaching staffs of North Carolina Central University, Cardinal Gibbons High School, and Franklin Academy in Wake Forest. For the past several years, Mr. Gray has worked as a player development coach, helping train college stars and current NBA players, but mentoring young players continues to be a priority for him. Through DIVERSE's training programs, he offers youth the opportunity to improve their basketball ability while also teaching them about leadership and life skills.

 Gab Smith is the executive director of CAMI Raleigh, a non-collecting contemporary art museum that hosts educational programs, cultural experiences, and non-traditional exhibitions by living artists. Ms. Smith has extensive experience in the museum world and served as the director of advancement and membership engagement for the Contemporary Art Foundation prior to taking on her current role.

 Lindsay Wrege is the CEO of 321 Coffee, a nonprofit pop-up coffee shop that is staffed by adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. 321 Coffee seeks to highlight the uniqueness of those with IDD and create an environment where the community can engage with and learn from them. Ms. Wrege founded 321 Coffee with three fellow N.C. State students in 2017, and it has since been honored by the Anna's Angels Foundation for its work in inspiring, believing, and dedication to blending communities.
