Program Overview



August 8, 2025, marked the conclusion of the sixth year of hosting the Raleigh Youth Conservation Corps in partnership with Conservation Corps North Carolina. This continued partnership between Raleigh Parks and CCNC gives local youth the chance to carry forward the legacy of the 1930s Civilian Conservation Corps by engaging in conservation-focused projects throughout Raleigh.

Two young adult leaders guided a four-week and a three-week crew, each consisting of six teenagers. Throughout the summer, participants completed a range of environmental projects and took part in educational sessions both on and off-site. Each day began with a stretch circle and safety briefing at the outdoor classroom near the Gatekeeper's Cottage before heading to the designated worksite.





Projects and Education



The 2025 Raleigh Youth Conservation Corps contributed to important projects across multiple Raleigh sites, including Annie Louise Wilkerson Nature Preserve, Crabtree Creek Trail, Dix Park, Durant Nature Preserve, Horseshoe Farm Nature Preserve, Rocky Branch Trail, and Walnut Creek Wetland Park. Their work included surveying leaf-mining insects, box turtles, Ashe trees, and soil; removing invasive plants to improve safety and visibility; and restoring trails and stream areas to support environmental health.

These activities provided hands-on experience in topics such as plant and animal identification, erosion control, and trail maintenance. The crews had the unique opportunity to collaborate with and learn from environmental professionals in various fields.

Featured Project Metrics

- 2240 hours of work
- 700 bales of pine straw spread
- 2.5 acres of invasive management
- 0.5 miles of trail built/improved
- 250 feet of sensitive plant fencing installed
- 100 plants planted
- 400 plants staged for art installation
- 3 erosion devices installed
- 19 drainage devices maintained
- 118 Ashe trees surveyed





Education Sessions and Demographics



This year's participants represented ten zip codes across Raleigh, Holly Springs, and Knightdale, offering a valuable opportunity for youth to connect with peers beyond their neighborhoods. Notably, this year's crew included three returning members and welcomed a guest speaker who had previously served on a Raleigh Youth Conservation Corps crew.

In addition to gaining new skills, the program helped them build professional networks, explore potential career paths, and foster a deeper connection to public green spaces through education. These experiences lead to newfound interest in wetland protection and arboriculture, sparking meaningful conversations with others.
