Letter from Volunteer Services Staff

This year marked another exceptional year of volunteerism with the Raleigh Parks, Recreation and Cultural Resources Department. The Volunteer Services Program saw growth from our community donating their time, talents, and resources as operations started getting back to normal post-pandemic.

The Volunteer Services Staff is proud to present the FY23 Volunteer Services Program Annual Report. This year we celebrated some great successes. Here are a few key highlights:

- Volunteer participation started to recover to pre-pandemic levels with over 10,000 volunteers
 assisting with park enhancement projects, youth athletic leagues, special events, and much more.
 Approximately 60,000 volunteer hours were contributed with the volunteer service being valued
 at \$1.8 million.
- As part of our department's Conservation Career Pipeline Initiative, the Volunteer Services
 Program in partnership with Conservation Corps North Carolina (CCNC) and the Dix Park
 Conservancy hosted our fourth CCNC Youth Conservation Corps crew and specifically our third
 CCNC Dix Park Youth Conservation Corps crew. This program offers teens from the Raleigh area
 the opportunity to gain work experience, as well as career development opportunities in the
 conservation field. This program won two awards this year.
- The Volunteer Services team started the transition of our volunteer database into a new volunteer management software. CERVIS will allow for easier recruiting, tracking of paperwork, and logging of volunteer hours. This will help standardize the reporting process across the Department and allow us to track brand new metrics which will help to showcase volunteer impact more effectively.
- Along with help from our city partners in GIS, we updated our Adopt-A-Trail GIS map to include real-time data on trail closures and to automatically update as the trails grow. This map will also show recently cleaned sections of trail as well as allow Adopt-A-Trail volunteers to report hours and inspection findings more quickly.

We want to thank you for your passion, dedication, and support to enhance and beautify the City of Raleigh. Because of YOU, the Raleigh Parks, Recreation and Cultural Resources Department continues to expand its resources, develop positive community relationships, and provide a great place for Raleigh Citizens to live and play.

Parks Maintenance & Natural Resources

- 5.584 Volunteers
- 12,718 Hours of Service
- \$380,904 Value of Service

These numbers reflect volunteers working in a park maintenance and conservation capacity. Examples are Adopt-A-Park and Adopt-A-Trail, Invasive Removals, Litter Cleanups, Citizen Science, Planting projects and more.

Recreation

- 2.144 Volunteers
- 35,203 Hours of Service
- \$1,054,330 Value of Service

These numbers reflect the volunteers supporting our recreational program offerings and special events. Examples include Athletic Coaches, Instructors, Teen Program, Active Adults, Aquatics, Wellness and more.

Resources

- 2460 Volunteers
- 9678 Hours of Service
- \$289,856 Value of Service

These numbers reflect the volunteers supporting both Historic and Cultural Resources. Examples are Museum Guides, Raleigh Arts, ESL Instructors, Holiday Express and more.

CCNC Dix Park Youth Conservation Corps Impacts



Raleigh Parks' Volunteer Services Program coordinates the CCNC Dix Park Youth Conservation Corps which is geared towards local teens. This program carries on the legacy of the Civilian Conservation Corps of the 1930s and provides hands-on work experience and career development/education opportunities related to the fields of conservation and park maintenance.

For five weeks, six teens and two crew leaders learned and worked alongside experts in the field. They completed 10 projects for Dorothea Dix Park, ranging from invasive plant removals all the way to special event support.
