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HRM Program Staff Works with Community to Bring History to Life

HRM Program staff have been working with community members of the South Park-East Raleigh Neighborhood Association over the past year on a new exhibit showcasing the history and culture of their historic neighborhood. The exhibit, Centuries in the Making: A Cultural Legacy of South Park and East Raleigh Neighborhoods explores the people and places that made these unique African American neighborhoods for over 100 years. Working with local design firm, Point Concepts, staff and community members strived to expand the historic information originally identified in a series of "knowledge maps" created in 2009 by NCSU landscape architecture students and community members. The exhibit opened September 2, 2023, featuring an expanded interpretation of these neighborhoods through historic photographs, profiles of influential community members, rare video segments, and artifacts. The exhibit represents an exciting first step of reinvestment in the John P. "Top" Greene Community Center. Administration of the center moved to the PRCR Resource Division in April 2023 and is now managed within the HRM Program Museum Section. The center, named for local community activist, John Greene, is located at 401 Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd. The park and building were part of the 2020 PRCR Bond program and will be undergoing major renovations in the next few years.

Dark Raleigh

If you're into podcasts, documentaries, movies, or books then you know that true crime is a popular genre. In fact, throughout history people have been intrigued by sensational crimes and grisly murders.

Retelling these stories is not often part of traditional exhibits or programs for most museums. But the City of Raleigh Museum is different, believing these dark chapters are a part of the city's history that should be shared.

Starting in 2017, the museum developed a true crime walking tour called Dark Raleigh. Every year, museum staff scours historic newspapers, diaries, letters, and published accounts of times when death came in unfortunate ways. This research is compiled and transformed into dramatic monologues which are performed by local actors. The Dark Raleigh tour visits these troubled souls and the hidden spots where many of the events took place.

For example, the Dark Raleigh tour told one story in the basement of the popular restaurant Death and Taxes, previously J.W. Brown's Coffin House. It was here that many of the city's deceased were taken, including one unfortunate visitor, Dr. E.W. Smith. Smith arrived in Raleigh in 1907 and wasted little time before heading to the Red-Light district centered around the 500 block of East Davie Street. Smith's evening went horribly awry: he was found dead the next morning at the bottom of the rock quarry and was taken to Brown's establishment.
