Chair's Letter

Every now and then in order to duck the chore of cutting grass, I get the idea in my head to start a conservation garden. A conservation garden replaces hard surfaces or turf grass of a traditional lawn with native plants. A conservation garden also promotes and preserves native species and provides wildlife habitat. I do not have to look far for a good model and blueprint of an exquisite conservation garden because nestled away in the Midtown North section of Raleigh lies one of Raleigh's most hidden treasures, the Joslin Garden. William and Mary Coker Joslin believed that parks and greenways are a large part of what makes Raleigh a vibrant and healthy place to live.

Consisting of over four acres of rolling hills and gardens overflowing with streams, walking trails, and a collection of rare and native plants, the Joslin Garden was designed and tended by the late William and Mary Coker Joslin from 1950 until 2016. The City of Raleigh in partnership with the City of Oaks Foundation manages the breathtaking park. The Joslins spent more than 60 years as good stewards of their land. Mary and William built bridges over the stream, planted many rare and native plants, grew all types of vegetables and fruits, and created perennial beds, a formal garden, a scuppernong arbor and several areas devoted to North Carolina native wildflowers. The garden is truly a vision too see. Well, I guess it never hurts to dream of a beautiful conservation garden like the Joslins. Now, back to the chore of cutting grass.

Latta University **Historic Park Grand** Opening

The HRM Program is very pleased to announce the grand opening of Latta University Historic Park on April 20th at 4 pm. This opening is the culmination of several years of planning and the efforts of countless members of the community and City of Raleigh staff.

In 2020, the City of Raleigh developed a Master Plan which called for taking a mostly open grass lot, and turning it into a place for walking, reflection, and learning about the Latta legacy. The implementation of the design would be done in three phases; construction for Phase 1 began in 2023 and is now complete.

As part of the opening ceremony, visitors will be able to walk the newly constructed walkway through the park, read the interpretive signage telling the history of the property, visit the granite foundation of the original Latta House, as well as attend a ribbon cutting ceremony. We invite everyone to join us for this historic event.

The Ellen Mordecai Garden

This excerpt is from a ca. 1975 presentation about the Ellen Mordecai Garden at Mordecai Historic Park.

"The 1830 garden at Mordecai House is a 3.10 14.25 6.45 reconstruction of one described by Ellen Mordecai 3.80 in Gleanings From Long Ago.
