In preparation for the City of Raleigh Museum's exhibit, *Diamond Days: The History of Baseball in Raleigh*, this month's Curator Corner will highlight elements of the exhibit design process and feature baseball-related items from the Collection.

The sights, sounds, and smells of a live baseball game are all incorporated into the design of *Diamond Days: The History of Baseball in Raleigh.* Visitors will begin the exhibit on homebase, and Raleigh's baseball history will unfold as visitors round the bases. The memorial plaque honors the life and legacy of the esteemed civil rights advocate, Bruce E. Lightner, who made both significant and lasting contributions to the fight for social justice in our Raleigh community. The ceremony brought together community leaders, family, friends, and supporters to celebrate the indelible impact Mr. Lightner made in advancing civil rights, fair housing, and economic empowerment. The ceremony featured remarks from distinguished guests, local community leaders, and family members, as well as Mr. Lightner himself.

The plaque now serves as a permanent tribute to Mr. Lightner's unwavering commitment to social justice, as well as a reminder of the ongoing work towards achieving equality and justice for all.

HRM staff worked with the Lightner family to first craft and then designate the memorial plaque.

Fanny's Room: A New Furnishing Plan for an Original Slave Dwelling

Public historian Vera Cecelski, site manager at Historic Stagville, will present on the research for the site's furnishing plan for the original slave quarters at Horton Grove. Inspired by the household of a matriarch named Fanny, this project traced Fanny's life, family, and community to contextualize her household. Despite the scarcity of sources about enslaved people's furnishings, careful research and comparative sources reveal the likely materials enslaved families used to furnish their home spaces.
