
CONCEPT DESIGN PROCESS

The 14-acre project site is currently a city maintenance facility. For over a decade, there was discussion within the City to transform the site into a public park and greenway. From 2021 to 2022, the design team developed three concept design alternates that presented a collection of solutions to address the complex infrastructure of the site and create unique spaces for park programming, stormwater treatment, and habitat. Chief among these design ideas was how to approach Pigeon House Branch.

Based on public engagement feedback, "Concept 3: Meander" was selected. This concept highlighted a "re-wilding" approach to the stream design with Pigeon House Branch coursing through the park. Concept 3 also offered passive recreation experiences including walking paths, gathering spaces, and naturalized areas.

Key features of the selected concept plan included:

- Complete removal of existing buildings and pavement
- Site remediation to address contaminated groundwater
- Daylighting and restoration of Pigeon House Branch
- Development of a natural and passive park




HOW WE GOT HERE

In November 2022, Raleigh City Council approved and adopted the Concept Design Plan for Smoky Hollow Park (formerly called Devereux Meadow Park). This concept plan is the basis for the Schematic Design phase.


Per the Concept Plan, this park development plan focuses on environmental remediation, stream restoration, flood and stormwater management, greenway trail implementation, and park improvements for passive recreation.

The future Smoky Hollow Park will offer walking paths, plazas, and extensive landscaped and naturalized areas. The centerpiece of this new park will be a restored Pigeon House Branch, realigned to flow through the middle of the park. A constructed wetland will work with the stream to improve water quality. The plan proposes multiple viewing areas for the stream and wetland along the pathways and from the plazas.

Current funding for this project comes from the 2014 and 2022 Raleigh Parks Bonds (\$13.5 million). An additional \$5.5 million in funding will come from a future Stormwater capital improvements allocation.












