Project Overview

Project Scope: Creation of Heritage Trail through the historic South Park neighborhood

Budget: \$4.5 Million

\$3M from the \$275M 2022 Parks Bond Referendum

\$1.5M from Federal Grant

\$120K for Public Art

Design Consultant: Design Workshop

Community Engagement: Concept Design: March 2023 – September 2024

Schematic Design: September/October 2025

Concept Design Phase

November 2023: Community Advisory Group (CAG) approved by City Council

Feb. 2024 – Oct. 2024: 6 Joint CAG meetings

June 2024 – Oct. 2024: 4 Public Open Houses

Project Background

Originally a community-initiated project.

South Park East Raleigh Neighborhood Association, Ms. Lonnette Williams, community members and other stakeholders worked with NCSU College of Design to produce the South Park Heritage Report in 2014.

"Protecting history, creating new economic opportunities, and enhancing the visual character of the built environment" were the main focus points of their project.

Report was the basis for South Park Heritage Trail








Project Purpose and Goals


A heritage trail is a collection of features within the streetscape and other public spaces which may include interpretive elements, art, and signage that tell the area's history from the perspective of its residents



Celebrate culture, history and legacy and promote community pride Strengthen community relationships, capacity and resources


Enhance mobility, connectivity and safety for all users Promote healthy living and increase access to high-quality public spaces








Public Art: Stacy Utley's Storytelling Beacons

- Figures filled with historical images from the South Park community's family photos, school yearbooks and artifacts from the City archives.

Artist Statement:

The Figure as a Storytelling Beacon: Silhouettes have long been a powerful form in African American art, symbolizing identity, memory, and cultural heritage. In public art, the human figure can serve as a powerful beacon – embodying lived histories, collective memory, and the resilience of community.

Estimated Schedule

- Design Development Phase: Fall 2025 Spring 2026
- National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Environmental Assessment Preparation: Fall
 2025 Summer 2027
- Construction Documents and Permitting: Spring 2026 Summer 2027
- Bidding and Contracts: Summer 2027 Fall 2027
- Construction: Fall 2027 Spring 2029

Significant Schedule Considerations

- Federal and State Permitting
- 3+ miles of linear project
- Right-of-Way and residential property coordination
