It's hard not to notice the rising prices of everyday essentials lately. Everything from chicken to eggs to clothing and cars have increased in price recently. Have you ever considered what a great value Raleigh water is?



A gallon of water from a discount store is \$1.12

A gallon of milk is \$3.59

A gallon of gas is \$3.48

A gallon of tap water from Raleigh Water is only .0035 cents! What a great value for your money!

Note: Raleigh Water bills in CCFs (centum cubic feet). Each CCF is 748 gallons and costs \$2.63 (for an inside City limit customer).

A Leaky Toilet Can Triple Your Water Bill! Be Sure to Repair Running Toilets to Save Money and Water Resources

A running toilet may not seem like a big deal, but according to the American Water Works Association, toilets are responsible for approximately 27 percent of the water used in homes daily. If there's a leaky toilet in your house, you could be losing up to 200 gallons of water daily and paying double or triple your normal cost.

When you hear running water from your toilet after you flush, that means your toilet is leaking. If you are experiencing a running and leaking toilet, you most likely need the flapper valve or flush valve replaced. Some leaks can be difficult to detect as the leaking is silent. So, if you notice a jump in your water bill it is important to call a specialist right away to address the problem.

Raleigh Yard Waste Cart Delivery Begins in May You Can Be A Part of Raleigh Reuse

Yard Waste cart delivery for Raleigh residents begins in May. You may see the name of the City's contracted vendor, Shafer, on the uniforms and trucks of crews who will be dropping off around 110,000 new carts!

The bright green carts will be delivered to households, beginning the first week in May. Delivery will be complete by July 5, when the new yard waste collection schedule will begin.

Pickup trucks with trailers will be on local roadways during the cart delivery period. Residents can contact

SWS@raleighNC.gov or call 919-996-3245 with any questions about cart deliveries or the new yard waste collection schedule. Residents can begin using the new cart upon delivery. Starting July 5, yard waste will be collected on the opposite week as curbside recycling. Yard waste is processed locally and turned into mulch and compost products available for purchase at the Raleigh Yard Waste Center.

Pool Maintenance: Five Ways to Reduce Water Pollution

Chlorinated or salt water from pools can pollute streams and creeks. This happens when chlorine and other pool chemicals enter a storm drain or stream. You can help protect the environment by making sure only rain goes down the storm drain. When you are maintaining a private or public pool – do not pump or drain water into the stormwater system.

Here are five easy ways to prevent pollution from pool water:

- 1. Wait at least 10 days after chlorinating a pool before releasing any water.
- 2. Clean out algae and leaves before draining your pool so you don't clog storm drains.
- 3. Release water from a chlorinated pool to a grassy area away from a stream or storm drain.
- 4. Don't have a grassy area? De-chlorinate and test the pool water to make sure chemical levels are low before releasing it. Visit a pool supply store for instructions.
- 5. For saltwater pools Drain the water to a grassy area a little at a time. You can damage your grass if you release the water with chemicals into your yard.
