






What is Vision Zero?

 Vision Zero is a goal to reduce & eliminate serious injuries and fatalities along our transportation network, while increasing safe, healthy, and equitable mobility for all.

Vision Zero Program Responsibilities

- General Safety Improvements- City & NCDOT Roadways
 - Signal studies, speed studies, & crash diagrams
 - Recommend mitigating measures/projects to improve safety, correct crash patterns, and help vulnerable users
 - Tactical Projects (High Impact, Low Cost)
- School Zone/Area Management (130+ schools)
 - Update and improve school zones/areas
 - Work with Neighborhood Traffic Management Program (NTMP) & combine projects around schools
- Streetlight Program
 - Install lighting in public right of way (proven counter measure)




General Safety Improvements- City & NCDOT Streets

- Identify areas of concern and develop improvements projects
- Since 2013, NCDOT has partnered with the City to construct more than 50 projects totaling to more than \$15 million.
- Another 40 projects currently in design or construction totaling to more than \$12.5 million

Street Light Program

- Street Lighting can reduce nighttime injury pedestrian crashes at intersections up to 42%
- City leases approximately 35,000 streetlights from Duke Energy
- 400+ streetlights are added annually from new development, roadway projects, and citizen requests
- Safety projects outside of Duke's offerings are part of program



Current Conditions


- 136 fatalities total (vehicle, bike, & ped)
 from 2016 to 2020
 - 42% of fatalities were the age of 55 or older
 - 35% of fatalities involved a pedestrian
 - 48% of fatalities were the drivers





Current Conditions

- All fatalities & serious Injuries from 2016 to 2020
- Data drives decision making
 - Heat map helps identifies High Injury Network (HIN) locations
 - Underserved Communities Census Tracts making up around 18% of Raleigh's population





Current Conditions (2022)

- 59 total fatalities as a result of 53 fatal crashes in 2022
 - 22,000 total crashes in Raleigh in 2022
- Fatality Location
 - 2 traffic fatalities occurred on private property
 - 6 traffic fatalities occurred on City maintained roadways
- 51 traffic fatalities occurred on NCDOT maintained roadways
- Crash Type
 - 1 bike related & 24 pedestrian related
- 30 car/truck/SUV related & 4 motorcycle/moped related



Accomplishing Vision Zero

- Ensure Vision Zero <u>is the</u>
 <u>foundation</u> for all City
 Transportation programs;
 - Mobility, Strategy, & Infrastructure
 - Complete Streets (CSIP)
 - Neighborhood Traffic Management Program (NTMP)
 - Capital Improvement Projects (CIP)
 - Transportation Comprehensive & Long-Term Plans
 - Streetlight Program
 - Development Services





Safe Streets & Roads for All (SS4A)

- Submitted SS4A Comprehensive Safety Action Plan Grant Application
 - Bipartisan Infrastructure Law passed in late 2021, USDOT appropriated
 \$5 billion in funds over the next 5 years specifically to help with
 Transportation safety and further develop VZ programs around the country
 - September 2022 Grant Application Submitted (Consultant)
 - 11 Letters of Support from External & Internal Stakeholder
 - \$1 million Project Cost
 — 80/20 match (\$50k pledge from NCDOT for matching funds)
 - COR awarded the grant from USDOT/FHWA on February 1, 2023
 - 18 to 24 months to draft Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (Consultant)
 - September 2024/2025- Submit SS4A Implementation grant application up to \$30 million



What We've Already Accomplished

- Collaborated with NCDOT and have constructed and/or programed approx. 90 spot safety projects totaling approx. \$30 million
- Improved approximately 50 school zones
- Downtown Pedestrian Improvements Project- Phase I
- Street Light Improvements
- Awarded SS4A Comprehensive Safety Action Plan Grant
- Speed Limit Reduction & Traffic Calming Projects



Next Steps

- Continue doing what we have been but also…
- Develop a Vision Zero Task Force & Engagement Strategy
- Develop Vision Zero Program Webpage
- Leverage Federal Funding
- Pilot tactical improvements
 - Downtown "Artistic" Curb Extensions with Flexible Delineators Pilot Locations- Spring/Summer 2023
 - Salisbury St. at the Courthouse (east side)
 - Salisbury St. at Hargett St (All 4 Corners)
 - Downtown RRFB Locations- Spring/Summer 2023
 - Wilmington St at One Exchange Plaza midblock
 - Blount St at Moore Square midblock
